Eliminate mosquito breeding habitats from your yard

Your yard may be breeding:

- St. Louis Encephalitis Mosquitoes
- Southern House Mosquitoes
- Asian Tiger Mosquitoes
- Yellow Fever Mosquitoes
- Tree Hole Mosquitoes
- West Nile Virus Mosquitoes
- Bromeliad Mosquitoes



It is critical that you understand where and how to properly eliminate mosquito breeding habitats around your home and community.

Don't overlook a single small pool of water, even if there are no mosquito larvae present.

A half-cup of water can produce enough mosquitoes to cause a problem.

Check these places in your yard:

- **1** Potted plants: don't overwater and remove pan if possible or dump unnecessary water.
- Drainage ditches: remove vegetation and any obstructions to water flow, or call your drainage department.
- Low grassy areas, tire tracks and swales: fill and regrade low areas if possible and keep grass mowed.
- Bird baths, barbeque grills, ashtrays and other small containers: cover grills, overturn or remove containers or flush with water at least once a week.
- Outdoor Faucets: check for standing water.
- Roof gutters: clean out leaves and debris.
- Pet dishes: replace water daily.
- 8 Large animal water troughs: flush weekly.





- Trash or spare parts: remove items or cover what cannot be thrown away.
- 10 Old tires: discard or put in a building. If not possible, stack tires flat and cover the top of each stack.
 - Rain barrels: cover with house screening to prevent mosquitoes from laying eggs.
- **12** Kiddie wading pools: empty or flush weekly.
- Bromeliads and similar types of plants: check them weekly and flush with water to remove debris in the leaf axil.
- - **14** Concrete slabs: seal any openings with sand or concrete.



15 Ponds: stock mosquito minnows.



Boats: cover or turn upside down.
